AMERICA Saint Isaac Jogues: Missionary to North America



Feast Day: October 19 (with the North American Martyrs)

St. Isaac Jogues (1607–1646) was a French Jesuit priest who traveled to North America in the 1600s to bring the message of Jesus to Indigenous peoples, especially the Huron and Iroquois. He worked with love and respect, learning native languages and cultures. Isaac suffered greatly for his faith—he was captured, tortured, and eventually martyred. Even after escaping back to France, he chose to return to mission territory to continue his work. Like members of the Missionary Childhood Association, St. Isaac Jogues shows us how to be brave in sharing Jesus' love, even when it's hard. His story reminds us to pray for children and missionaries who live in places where faith can be dangerous.

PERU



Deep in the Amazon Rainforest, the Catholic Church is planting the seeds of faith in children through the Missionary Childhood Association. The Apostolic Vicariate of Requena is playing a crucial role in evangelizing indigenous peoples and rural communities. An Apostolic Vicariate is similar to a diocese, but is typically established in mission territories where the Church is still emerging and growing.

In the Amazon region of Peru, including places like Requena, a lot of families don't have much money. They live in small wooden houses, and some don't have running water, electricity, or good schools nearby. Many people grow their own food, go fishing, or work in the forest to survive. Because the towns are far apart and surrounded by jungle and rivers, it's hard to travel, and getting help—like doctors, teachers, or even churches—can take a long time. That's why the missionaries are so important there: they try to bring hope, education, and help to the people who need it most.

- School supplies, uniforms, and enrollment for young kids in kindergarten and elementary school
- Meals and vitamins for undernourished children
